Evening meeting 14th October 2019, UCL London

At this meeting Henrietta McBurney Ryan, curator and historian, gave us a talk entitled "Animal, Vegetable, Mineral and ? Dr John Addenbrooke's Cabinet of Materia Medica". She explained that the cabinet is currently housed at St Catherine's College Cambridge in their Armitage Room.

Henrietta's talk described the contents and use of the cabinet in the context of other medical cabinets and collections of the period. She highlighted some of the more surprising objects discovered, and discussed the importance of this rare object in the history of collecting. It was in 1711 that Dr John Addenbrooke, founder of the now famous Cambridge hospital, gave his *Materia Medica* cabinet to the College.

In 2016 it was the subject of a study involving an inventory and identification of its contents. While much of the contents were the animal, vegetable and mineral substances typical of remedial medical practice of the mid-seventeenth to early-eighteenth centuries, some unexpected objects were found to be part of Addenbrooke's cabinet. Many of these curiosities were illustrated in the talk and many items await explanation, not the least of which were some man-made artefacts.

A chronology of Addenbrooke's life began the talk and focused on his medical training and as part of this his study of *materia medica*. Only part of the contents have been researched to date, there needs to be some more conservation work done before some of the original contents can be unwrapped or handled.

The talk included a short history of Addenbrooke's hospital, dating back to 1766, funded initially by a bequest in John's will.

Obituary - Professor Terry Turner, by Briony Hudson

Terry Turner was a founder member of BSHP, the organiser of its first conference in 1967 in his home city of Cardiff, and attended many BSHP conferences, often as a speaker.

He started his pharmacy career aged 14 with the renowned Cardiff pharmacy, Robert Drane. After National Service with the Welsh Fusiliers, he studied the BPharm course at Cardiff Technical College from 1951. Other than a short stint as manager at Drane's pharmacy, he spent the rest of his life at Cardiff's School of Pharmacy progressing from Lecturer in Microbiology, to Senior Lecturer in Pharmacognosy and Head of the Pharmacognosy department, and Emeritus Professor on his retirement. In addition to pharmacognosy, he became a specialist in surgical dressing research, publishing widely in both areas.

Terry was a founder member of the new Pharmaceutical Society Welsh Executive or Rhanbarth de Cymru, established in 1976. He was elected as a PSGB Fellow in the same year, and chaired the Welsh Executive from 1980-81. He was awarded the OBE in 1989 for services to pharmacy in Wales, and the PSGB Charter Silver Medal in 1991 for outstanding service to the profession.

He had always been interested in pharmacy history, and began to collect material that was offered from colleagues, closing down businesses and found in sales. In the early 1980s, items from his collection were first put on display in the School of Pharmacy's Redwood Building, and the range and extent of objects on show has steadily grown to its current total of around 1500 objects over 3 floors. In 2009, he gave his collection, known as The Turner Collection, to Cardiff University for display at the School of Pharmacy. He also established a significant display of pharmacy history in the Apothecary's Hall at the National Botanic Garden of Wales, and donated an important collection of *materia medica* specimens to Amgueddfa Cymru (National Museum Wales).



In 2017 he was awarded our Leslie Matthews Medal for his original and scholarly work in the history of British pharmacy.

He was a passionate advocate for pharmacy history, a wonderful storyteller, and a generous donor of time and expertise. His lasting legacy is his collections and the enthusiasm for pharmacy history that he inspired in so many people in Cardiff and beyond.
