# Evening meeting at UCL on Monday 15th October

This was our last evening lecture of the year and we enjoyed hearing about "The Enlightened Mr Parkinson". The talk was given by Dr Cherry Lewis who is Honorary Research Fellow at the University of Bristol School of Earth Sciences. We learnt that no picture seems to exist of James Parkinson, it is thought however that the image on the front cover of Cherry's book (taken from "The Village Apothecary" courtesy of the Wellcome Collection) might well have been him given that he was a village apothecary who practiced in Hoxton, Shoreditch where his father was an apothecary surgeon.


Having heard all about his background and career in London in the late 18<sup>th</sup> Century we were told of his political writings and activities under the pseudonym "Old Hubert" done alongside his association with Daniel Isaac Eaton a radical writer and publisher. James was acquitted of plotting against the King and after this carried on with some pioneering work in medicine. Not many of us knew about his main interest in fossils and in particular his study of ammonites. He is even commemorated by the name of the ammonite *Parkinsonia parkinsoni*.

One day he noticed a medical condition causing someone to flex and to shake and which caused him to be curious, so much so that he became the first to identify the symptoms here versus other forms of tremor. In 1817 his famous book "An Essay on Shaking Palsy" was published. Eventually this condition became known as Parkinson's Disease and for which there is still no known cure.


He died on 21<sup>st</sup> December 1824 having suffered a stroke. He left his apothecary's shop to his son, John. His collection of organic remains was given to his wife - much of it was sold but neither these nor a sale catalogue have ever been found. He was buried at St. Leonard's Church, Shoreditch where his life is commemorated with a stone tablet, the exact site of his grave is not known. His body may lie in the crypt or in the churchyard. A blue plaque at 1 Hoxton Square marks the site of his home.

Cherry was thanked for her informative talk which was enjoyed by us and by a number of students.

#### Theft from RPS Museum

The RPS Headquarters building in East Smithfield was broken into during the early morning of Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> November. Sadly the "first president's chain" was stolen from a museum case which was smashed into by the lone intruder. This chain, shown on the right, was engraved with all the names of all past Presidents from 1841-1968. It dates from 1901 and comprises 58 panels in 18-carat gold. There is a second chain which is worn by the current President. The alarms did sound while the two doors into the main reception area were smashed open. The Police were called and the facilities team attended soon afterwards.

Needless to say the item in question is irreplaceable and our sympathies go to the RPS Museum staff who were understandably shocked and saddened by this tragic loss of a precious historical artefact.
