Firstly, all assembled at the small chapel at Epsom Cemetery to hear memories from family members plus one by Briony Hudson aptly entitled "I don't like change" and a repeat of the eulogy given by friend Philip Smalley which he gave at Peter's funeral.

Then all went to the graveside for the interment of Peter's ashes alongside those of his beloved wife Chris. Following this everyone went to nearby Epsom Race Course for a buffet lunch where a table of photographs and personal items, such as certificates, had been arranged (see right).

Aspirin 125th Anniversary Symposium - Appeal for Information

Aspirin (acetylsalicylic acid) was first synthesised, at least for therapeutic purposes, by the Bayer company on 10th August 1897; BSHP and BSHM are currently in the early stages of investigating the possibility of holding a joint meeting to mark the upcoming 125th Anniversary.

The potential scope of the meeting might include: use of plant-derived medicines in ancient history; the roles of individuals in the rediscovery and evaluation of salicylic acid; the rise of industrial chemistry; marketing of consumer-aimed pharmaceutical products in the early 20th century; the contribution of the pharmaceutical industry to the horrors of the world wars; the proliferation of pain killers in the 20th century; development of gold-standard methodology to answer pharmaceutical research questions; Aspirin's place in popular culture; Aspirin's role today, novel approaches and applications.

1) Online Pharmacy History Explorer Course:

Our Society is pleased to be working with the Faculty for the History and Philosophy of Medicine and Pharmacy at the Society of Apothecaries to present a new online course this Autumn. Directed by Stuart Anderson and Briony Hudson, we hope you will join us for an exploration of pharmacy history from the perspectives of patients, controlled substances, and wider histories.

With a range of international speakers, delegates can access pre-recorded online lectures at their own pace during September and October, and take part in live Zoom discussions with the speakers during November. - Dr Yewande Okuleye "Cannabis Flowers: Poison or Medicine".
- Kim Walker "Recreating Historical Techniques for Cinchona Preparation".



21st June "How Empire Turned People into Patients: Big Pharma's Early Modern Roots" by Dr Zachary Dorner (University of Maryland).

The theme of his talk was that during the 18th century, trends in overseas trade, enslaved labour, and colonial warfare hastened a turn toward viewing individuals as interchangeable patients who could be targets of similar medicines. Seeing people this way has had significant consequences for healthcare: altering practices and supporting a globalized pharmaceutical industry.
